Professor Schwarz is an internationally renowned scholar of nineteenth and twentieth-century German and Comparative literature whose distinguished career spans six decades and three continents. He was born in Vienna, Austria, where he lived until 1938; he studied in Ecuador until 1949, and completed his higher education in the United States in the 1950s. Professor Schwarz has been on the faculty of Washington University since 1961. He has also taught at Harvard University, University of California at Berkeley and at Irvine, University of Otago, Dunedin, New Zealand, The Ohio State University, and elsewhere. He is the recipient of numerous international distinctions, among them the AATG Award of Most Distinguished Germanist of the Year, the Honorary "Matura," and held a position as Writer-in-Residence from the City of Vienna; he was awarded the St. George Medal from the city of Gorizia, Italy, and the Joseph von Eichendorff Medal from the Eichendorff Gesellschaft in Erlangen.
